Kommentar This course is designed for

(i) new BA students who have not yet passed a recognized test to prove sufficient English language skills and therefore have only conditionally been admitted to their course of study, and

(ii) students who want to take up an MA course of study at the English Department and therefore must meet a similar requirement, but with a higher minimum grade defined by the Department.

This class will prepare students for the TOEFL-ITP test, recognized by the Department for the requirements stated above. We will practice the required skills and develop strategies to be successful.

The course runs in winter only. Students are divided into two cohorts: *cohort one* comes to class the first half of the term (i.e. the first seven weeks) and *cohort two* comes to class the second half of the term (i.e. the last seven weeks). Cohorts will be set up alphabetically by the tutor after registration on Studip has closed. It is possible to get credits for the course.

There are two exam dates in winter: one in December and one in February. An additional exam date will be offered in May/June.

Please note that the class is free of charge, but you will have to pay a fee for the final test (approximately 40 €).

Kommentar

"If I had to select a single work of sublime fiction from the last century," literary critic Harold Bloom said in 2009, "it would probably be *Mason & Dixon*," Thomas Pynchon's 773-page historical novel that follows the exploits of two eighteenth-century land surveyors named Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon. Bloom is by no means the novel's only admirer. *Mason & Dixon* was published in 1997 to universal acclaim, and it reaffirmed Pynchon's reputation as the grand master of the postmodern "meganovel" in a decade that saw the publication of a whole range of meganovels, from William H. Gass's *The Tunnel* (1995) to

David Foster Wallace's *Infinite Jest* (1996) and Don DeLillo's *Underworld* (1997). What is it, then, that makes *Mason & Dixon* such a sublime work of fiction?

In this class, we will explore precisely this question by means of a semester-long close reading that divides Pynchon's novel into weekly segments of 50-60 pages. As a general guide, we will use the questions, notes, and commentary that were produced as part of the first online "social reading" of the novel, which began in May 1997 and was hosted by the "Pynchon-L" ListServer. Students interested in taking this class are strongly encouraged to sample these notes, which have been collected on http://masondixon.pynchonwiki.com/wiki/index.php?title=Dinn%27s_Notes, in order to get a good first impression of the novel and its demands on the reader.

Please be advised that this is a reading-intensive course intended only for students who are prepared to take on a literary challenge and who are willing to actively participate in class discussion. If the prospect of reading a 773-page novel does not deter you, if you would like to learn more about American postmodernism, and if you are interested in American history, then this class is for you. If, on top of that, you would relish the idea of being able to call the bluff of all those hipsters who name-drop Pynchon but have only ever read his 100-page classic *The Crying of Lot 49*, then this course is *especially* for you.

Required reading: Thomas Pynchon's *Mason & Dixon* (no preferred edition). Please make sure to have purchased the novel well in advance of our first session.

This course will explore some of the main trends in Jewish American fiction since the late 1950s. Of central concern will be the literary depiction of the process Karen Brodtkin has referred to as "how Jews became white folks." Surveying the fiction of the last 50 years suggests changing models of Jewish identity, "ethnicity," and religion. Earlier representations of assimilation and intermarriage have given way to anxieties about the integrity of Jewish memory and culture. A literature that many mid-century critics compared to regionalism, and particularly to Southern literature, is now widely understood to be one "minority" discourse among many, navigating not only its cultural "location" but the fine line between multi-cultural difference and mainstream acceptance. One important factor in Jewish American fiction is the increasing significance of the Holocaust, and the elegiac mode in general, in defining what is often—but not always—a secular version of Jewishness on par with other ethnicities. However, Jewish American literature also bears witness to the emergence of a new religiosity that parallels the awakening occurring in other American religions. Finally, Israel has played a crucial if ambiguous role in the geopolitical configurations of Jewish American identity, which must negotiate the ambiguous territory between Zionism and "Diasporism," to borrow a term from Philip Roth. These themes and issues will help direct our analyses as we engage in close readings of the novels below.

Kommentar	<p>Despite the universal popularity of American sitcoms and comedic films in the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, satire has not been a prominent form in American literary culture. Nevertheless, as Juvenal, the founder of one school of satire, famously wrote 'Difficile est saturam non scribere' [it is difficult not to write satire]. In this course, we will look at a large span of American history and the various ways in which writers have satirised it. In particular, we will look at how American ways of life, politics and cultures is satirised and the purposes for which it is done. As with all satire, this course brings together writers from across the political spectrum, from the radical left to bemused traditionalists.</p> <p>Week One: Introduction. Kommentar	<p>In this seminar, we will study an alternative, often hidden, tradition of writing in American literary history. Written by, about, and for American workers, working-class literature allows us to explore the particular conditions and kinds of work in the United States (including industrial labor, unpaid domestic work, immigrant and migrant labor) and the experiences of working-class communities, their traditions and values. In doing so, we will pose the following questions: How do working-class experiences shape literary expression and production? In what way does working-class literature negotiate forms of power, oppression, and conflict? How does class intersect with gender, race, ethnicity and other markers of identity? To address these questions, we will look at a variety of genres (poems, short stories, novels, and autobiographical texts) which reflect and represent the heterogeneous character of America's working class from the mid-nineteenth century through the twentieth century. We will contextualize our reading of the texts with a discussion of key moments in American industrial and labor history.</p> <p>Please purchase Upton Sinclair's <i>The Jungle</i> before the start of the semester. In the past four decades, David Cronenberg has built himself a reputation of being one of the most audacious and idiosyncratic filmmakers in contemporary cinema. Kommentar	<p>This is the first in a series of four lecture courses offered consecutively over a period of two years. It is designed to acquaint students with the literature and culture of North America from the late sixteenth- through the early nineteenth-centuries, i.e. the period of exploration and settlement, the American Revolution, the Early Republic, and the Age of Jackson. We will discuss some of the exemplary texts from these periods, analyzing their characteristic forms and themes as well as the history of their interpretation. Specific attention will be paid to key literary concepts, debates, and interpretive methodologies. We will also discuss important issues such as the role of religion in American culture and the separation of church and state; the theory and practice of federalism; enlightenment notions of commerce; slavery; western expansion; and the wars waged against Native American tribes. We will read examples of the sermon, epic, mock epic, occasional poetry; philosophical, religious, revolutionary, and anti-slavery tracts; travel narratives, captivity narratives, pamphlets, broadsides, dramas, speeches, letters; excerpts from early novels; and we will discuss contacts and exchanges between native and colonial cultures and the translation/transcription of traditionally oral tales. Kommentar	This class sets out to discuss the significance of finance and the economy for American culture. How have "money matters" impacted American cultural history and rhetorics from the formative years of the nation (or, to be more precise, the "American project") to the present? How have the concepts of rags-to-riches and the American Dream been negotiated and developed against the backdrop of politico-economic trends and sociocultural conditions? How exactly have American presidents, social commentators, reformers, cul-

tural critics, and writers expressed their stance vis-à-vis the concatenation of finance, the economy, and cultural life?

In order to trace these questions, we will investigate eras and epochs, phenomena, concepts, and ideologies that were decisive lynchpins for economic developments and that proved crucial in the course of U.S. cultural history - such as the early republic, the Gilded Age, Progressivism, the Great Depression, the War on Poverty of the Sixties, the Reagan years, or the financial crisis of 2008.

Kommentar

The argument that presidential communication has an impact on the nature, scope, and influence of the presidency as institution is far from new (see e.g. Tulis 1987). Yet, given the current administration's use of instant communication and its often remediated feuds with both the legislative and the mass media, a point can be made for a new shift in the contouring of the presidency. In order to fully assess the resulting instable relationship between governmental institutions and the general public on the level of both discourse and practice, we will take a look at the development of presidential rhetoric since its very inception. We will discuss the unique rhetoric of a number of Presidents, among them Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, F.D. Roosevelt, George W. Bush, Obama, and Trump. We will address different genres of presidential discourse (e.g. the State of the Union and the Inaugural Address), presidents' responses to crises (e.g. impending war and terrorism, economic recession, etc.), and the addressees of presidential speeches (e.g. Congress, the American public, etc.) while paying particular attention to questions of style, structure, framing, and performance.

The second part of the lecture series, "Approaches and Methods in Media Studies," will focus on media theory, visual culture, material culture and cultural studies. The lecture will be concerned with media history, the relation between (mass) media and society, media aesthetics, models of communication, and questions of cultural memory, technology, materiality and embodiment. Other relevant issues are medial configurations of time and space, networks and systems, concepts of hyperreality, postmodernity and the digital. We will also consider theories of single media: photography, the cinema, television, the computer and mobile media.</p> <p>The lecture will introduce a number of key texts and major schools that have been influential in the development of critical media and cultural studies: The Toronto School, the Frankfurt School, German media theory, British Cultural Studies, theories of postmodernism and visual culture, film and television theory, theories of material culture, systems theory, and actor-network theory.</p> <p>Key thinkers are Theodor W. Kommentar

This class sets out to trace the captivating and variegated movement known as the "Harlem Renaissance," which is generally regarded as the first full-scale surge in cultural and artistic self-representation and activity by African Americans. Taking its origin in Harlem in the early 1920s, but spreading into other urban centers of the United States in the course of the ensuing decade, this movement - known as the "New Negro Movement" at the time - brought to fame a variety of writers, artists, and philosophers who sought to define, promote and change African American culture and literature.

In this class we will be concerned with a selection of the fiction, poetry, and political essays produced in the Harlem Renaissance - against the backdrop of politico-cultural developments (segregation, anti-black violence) as well as literary and artistic trends (modernism, Primitivism) of the time. In this context, we will consider representations of gender and sexuality, the tensions between the rural South and the urban North, and the co-existence of celebrations of common black folk culture and bohemian, avant-garde performance sitting at the heart of the movement.

Class readings (such as excerpts, short stories, selected poetry, and essays) will be provided in a reader at the beginning of the semester; but you need to purchase the four - short - novels which we will read in full length. These are Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* (Dover), Zora Neale Hurston's *Their Eyes Were Watching God* (Virago Modern Classics), Langston Hughes's *Not Without Laughter* (Dover), and Claude McKay's *Home to Harlem* (Northeastern UP).

Further secondary literature will be made available on the reserve shelf in the library.

Kommentar

In this course we will study various forms of creative nonfiction: essays, memoirs, biographical pieces, journalism, nature and travel writing. We will analyze and compare the variety of voices, styles, poetic and fictional techniques used in this range of genres. Thematically, the selection of texts will focus on the experiences of pain and adversity, both as a personal experience and moments of cultural and political unrest. As readers, we explore how nonfictional narratives that appropriate fictional storytelling techniques change our reception and understanding of stories and events. Thematically, we will particularly focus on questions of racial and sexual identity, social and political struggle, the experience of loss and illness, rivalry and friendship, urban and alternative life styles.

Texts to be read range from early twentieth-century essays by Randolph Bourne, William James, and Gertrude Stein, to the New Journalism of the 1960s and 70s, especially the work of Joan Didion and Joe Eszterhas. The experience of growing up black in the Americas, racial struggle, and the negotiation of ethnic and cultural identities will be studied in the writings of James Baldwin, and the recent film *I'm Not Your Negro* (2016) based on Baldwin's work.

We will also read Ta-Nehisi Coates's *Between the World and Me* (2015), and essays by Edwidge Danticat, Jonathan Franzen, Vivian Gornick, Mark Greif, Mary Oliver, and Colson Whitehead. Lyrical forms of nonfiction to be discussed include authors such as Elisabeth Bishop, Robert Pinsky, and Claudia Rankine's *Citizen: An American Lyric* (2014). Mary Cappello's "Wending Artifice: Creative Nonfiction" (2014) will serve us as a critical approach for framing the topic of the course.

Kommentar

This course will consider some of the classic authors of the American Renaissance: Emerson, Thoreau, Fuller, Hawthorne, Melville, Whitman, Dickinson, and Douglass. The emphasis will be on Emerson as the thinker that other writers had to come to terms with. His insistence that each individual has the ability, even the moral obligation, to define his own

relation to nature will be the prism through which we consider Thoreau's retreat to Walden Pond, Fuller's vindication of the rights of women, Hawthorne's investigation of personal guilt, Melville's encyclopedic depiction of whale hunting, Whitman's expansive democratic poetics, Dickinson's intense introspection, and Douglass' struggle for personal freedom and the abolition of slavery. This course will require a lot of reading, but it will provide students with a firm foothold in the first body of literature to define itself as self-consciously American.

Kommentar

This class sets out to trace the captivating and variegated movement known as the "Harlem Renaissance," which is generally regarded as the first full-scale surge in cultural and artistic self-representation and activity by African Americans. Taking its origin in Harlem in the early 1920s, but spreading into other urban centers of the United States in the course of the ensuing decade, this movement - known as the "New Negro Movement" at the time - brought to fame a variety of writers, artists, and philosophers who sought to define, promote and change African American culture and literature.

In this class we will be concerned with a selection of the fiction, poetry, and political essays produced in the Harlem Renaissance - against the backdrop of politico-cultural developments (segregation, anti-black violence) as well as literary and artistic trends (modernism, Primitivism) of the time. In this context, we will consider representations of gen-

der and sexuality, the tensions between the rural South and the urban North, and the co-existence of celebrations of common black folk culture and bohemian, avant-garde performance sitting at the heart of the movement.

Class readings (such as excerpts, short stories, selected poetry, and essays) will be provided in a reader at the beginning of the semester; but you need to purchase the four - short - novels which we will read in full length. These are Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* (Dover), Zora Neale Hurston's *Their Eyes Were Watching God* (Virago Modern Classics), Langston Hughes's *Not Without Laughter* (Dover), and Claude McKay's *Home to Harlem* (Northeastern UP).

Further secondary literature will be made available on the reserve shelf in the library.

Kommentar

In this course we will study various forms of creative nonfiction: essays, memoirs, biographical pieces, journalism, nature and travel writing. We will analyze and compare the variety of voices, styles, poetic and fictional techniques used in this range of genres. Thematically, the selection of texts will focus on the experiences of pain and adversity, both as a personal experience and moments of cultural and political unrest. As readers, we explore how nonfictional narratives that appropriate fictional storytelling techniques change our reception and understanding of stories and events. Thematically, we will particularly focus on questions of racial and sexual identity, social and political struggle, the experience of loss and illness, rivalry and friendship, urban and alternative life styles.

Texts to be read range from early twentieth-century essays by Randolph Bourne, William James, and Gertrude Stein, to the New Journalism of the 1960s and 70s, especially the work of Joan Didion and Joe Eszterhas. The experience of growing up black in the Americas, racial struggle, and the negotiation of ethnic and cultural identities will be studied in the writings of James Baldwin, and the recent film *I'm Not Your Negro* (2016) based on Baldwin's work.

We will also read Ta-Nehisi Coates's *Between the World and Me* (2015), and essays by Edwidge Danticat, Jonathan Franzen, Vivian Gornick, Mark Greif, Mary Oliver, and Colson Whitehead. Lyrical forms of nonfiction to be discussed include authors such as Elisabeth Bishop, Robert Pinsky, and Claudia Rankine's *Citizen: An American Lyric* (2014). Mary Cappello's "Wending Artifice: Creative Nonfiction" (2014) will serve us as a critical approach for framing the topic of the course.

Kommentar This course will consider some of the classic authors of the American Renaissance: Emerson, Thoreau, Fuller, Hawthorne, Melville, Whitman, Dickinson, and Douglass. The emphasis will be on Emerson as the thinker that other writers had to come to terms with. His insistence that each individual has the ability, even the moral obligation, to define his own relation to nature will be the prism through which we consider Thoreau's retreat to Walden Pond, Fuller's vindication of the rights of women, Hawthorne's investigation of personal guilt, Melville's encyclopedic depiction of whale hunting, Whitman's expansive democratic poetics, Dickinson's intense introspection, and Douglass' struggle for personal freedom and the abolition of slavery. This course will require a lot of reading, but it will provide students with a firm foothold in the first body of literature to define itself as self-consciously American.

Kommentar

Despite the universal popularity of American sitcoms and comedic films in the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, satire has not been a prominent form in American literary culture. Nevertheless, as Juvenal, the founder of one school of satire, famously wrote 'Difficile est saturam non scribere' [it is difficult not to write satire]. In this course, we will look at a large span of American history and the various ways in which writers have satirised it. In particular, we will look at how American ways of life, politics and cultures is satirised and the purposes for which it is done. As with all satire, this course brings together writers from across the political spectrum, from the radical left to bemused traditionalists.

Kommentar This class sets out to trace the captivating and variegated movement known as the "Harlem Renaissance," which is generally regarded as the first full-scale surge in cultural and artistic self-representation and activity by African Americans. Taking its origin in Harlem in the early 1920s, but spreading into other urban centers of the United States in the course of the ensuing decade, this movement - known as the "New Negro Movement" at the time - brought to fame a variety of writers, artists, and philosophers who sought to define, promote and change African American culture and literature.

In this class we will be concerned with a selection of the fiction, poetry, and political essays produced in the Harlem Renaissance - against the backdrop of politico-cultural developments (segregation, anti-black violence) as well as literary and artistic trends (modernism, Primitivism) of the time. In this context, we will consider representations of gender and sexuality, the tensions between the rural South and the urban North, and the co-existence of celebrations of common black folk culture and bohemian, avant-garde performance sitting at the heart of the movement.

Class readings (such as excerpts, short stories, selected poetry, and essays) will be provided in a reader at the beginning of the semester; but you need to purchase the four - short - novels which we will read in full length. These are Nella Larsen's *Quicksand* (Dover), Zora Neale Hurston's *Their Eyes Were Watching God* (Virago Modern Classics), Langston Hughes's *Not Without Laughter* (Dover), and Claude McKay's *Home to Harlem* (Northeastern UP).

Further secondary literature will be made available on the reserve shelf in the library.

Kommentar

In this course we will study various forms of creative nonfiction: essays, memoirs, biographical pieces, journalism, nature and travel writing. We will analyze and compare the variety of voices, styles, poetic and fictional techniques used in this range of genres. Thematically, the selection of texts will focus on the experiences of pain and adversity, both as a personal experience and moments of cultural and political unrest. As readers, we explore how nonfictional narratives that appropriate fictional storytelling techniques change our reception and understanding of stories and events. Thematically, we will particularly focus on questions of racial and sexual identity, social and political struggle, the experience of loss and illness, rivalry and friendship, urban and alternative life styles.

Texts to be read range from early twentieth-century essays by Randolph Bourne, William James, and Gertrude Stein, to the New Journalism of the 1960s and 70s, especially the work of Joan Didion and Joe Eszterhas. The experience of growing up black in the Americas, racial struggle, and the negotiation of ethnic and cultural identities will be studied in the writings of James Baldwin, and the recent film *I'm Not Your Negro* (2016) based on Baldwin's work.

We will also read Ta-Nehisi Coates's *Between the World and Me* (2015), and essays by Edwidge Danticat, Jonathan Franzen, Vivian Gornick, Mark Greif, Mary Oliver, and Colson Whitehead. Lyrical forms of nonfiction to be discussed include authors such as Elisa-

beth Bishop, Robert Pinsky, and Claudia Rankine's *Citizen: An American Lyric* (2014). Mary Cappello's "Wending Artifice: Creative Nonfiction" (2014) will serve us as a critical approach for framing the topic of the course.

The final selection of works that we will read will be provided with the syllabus at the beginning of the term.

Kommentar	<p>This course will consider some of the classic authors of the American Renaissance: Emerson, Thoreau, Fuller, Hawthorne, Melville, Whitman, Dickinson, and Douglass. The emphasis will be on Emerson as the thinker that other writers had to come to terms with. His insistence that each individual has the ability, even the moral obligation, to define his own relation to nature will be the prism through which we consider Thoreau's retreat to Walden Pond, Fuller's vindication of the rights of women, Hawthorne's investigation of personal guilt, Melville's encyclopedic depiction of whale hunting, Whitman's expansive democratic poetics, Dickinson's intense introspection, and Douglass' struggle for personal freedom and the abolition of slavery.
